"Free"

For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. Romans 6:23

Are you like me in believing I ought to pay for some things, but others things I should get for free? Let me give you a few examples:

- \* I expect to pay for my seat on an airplane, but ... I think my suitcase ought to ride for free.
- \* I expect to pay for gas at a service station, but ... I believe air for my tires should be free.
- \* I expect to pay taxes to the government, so ... I don't expect to be charged entry to a National Park.

Still, looking at that list, I have to be thankful I'm not a woman in Zimbabwe who is giving birth to her child in the hospital. In a nation where the average income is \$150 a year, hospitals routinely charge \$50 to deliver a baby. While that cost is high, a baby's delivery is something for which you expect to pay. But, in Zimbabwe some hospitals charge a woman \$5 for every time she screams during delivery. Even worse, they won't release the child until the charges are paid.

Yes, some things in life have to be paid for, and other things ought to be free.

At the top of the list of things for which a person must pay is the price of his sin. People are terribly wrong if they think they can violate God's will and commandments and get away without making restitution. There are no loopholes, no hidden escape clauses, no wiggle room.

Scripture is clear: "the wages of sin is death."

Sadly, even the best examples of humanity are unable to pay that price. Try as we might, struggle as we will, throughout our lives the debt for our sin keeps growing. Without assistance we would live and die with the balance sheet showing a giant, outstanding debt being owed to the Lord.

Thankfully, the Lord also believes there are things in life which ought to be free. At the top of God's list of free things is forgiveness of sin. Of course, forgiveness is free only for us. God's justice demanded our debt had to be paid. Seeing our helplessness, the Lord sent His Son into the world as one of us. Here, Jesus took our place and throughout His life and with His death, paid the debt our transgressions had incurred.

Now, with the Savior's third-day resurrection from the dead, our debt has been wiped out and all who believe on Jesus as their Savior are forgiven and freed. Because that is so, St. Paul didn't end his sentence with "the wages of sin is death." No, because of Jesus' blood-bought forgiveness the apostle could continue: "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

All of this explains why you and I should be eternally grateful we have a God who believes there are things in life which need to be paid for and other things which ought to be free.

**THE PRAYER:** Dear Lord, I give thanks Jesus has paid a debt I could not pay. May I live my life in appreciation of the price He paid so that I might be freely forgiven. In His Name, Amen.

### From The Desk of Pastor Nebel:

### "Happy New (School) Year!"

In the Spring 2013 of <u>Concordia Historical Institute Quarterly</u> Dr. Mark Braun, a professor at Wisconsin Lutheran College (WELS) authored an article that was very interesting to me. "What Our Fathers Taught Us about Lutheran Schools" focused on how Lutheran church leaders in America in the late 1800s emphasized the importance of Lutheran schools. I share with you the headings from the article before I move on to two items that I want to highlight:

Our fathers taught us the biblical command to teach the gospel to our children.

Our fathers taught us to appreciate the educa tional heritage of Martin Luther.

Our fathers taught us the Lutheran schools were an essential component in our ministry.

Our fathers taught us the great importance and supreme blessings of Christian day schools.

A footnote in this article cited another article called "A Grave Situation and How It Is Met" in the April 1931 edition of <u>Lutheran School Journal</u>. The author of this article was A.C. Stellhorn, School Executive for the LCMS at that time. Does that name sound familiar to us? It should! He was a Red Bud native, born in our area on June 2, 1878. One of our very own, he knew the benefits of Lutheran education and was a leader in our church body when it came to encouraging congregations to start and support Lutheran day schools in the first half of the last century.

Another footnote in Mark Braun's article addresses a common reason parents have for not enrolling their children in their congregation's day school, that they don't want to "shelter" or "isolate" their children from the world. In a January 1957 article "New Interest in Christian Day Schools" Carl Lawrenz responds in a very modern way:

It is not the isolation of our children that we have to fear in these days of television, radio, and the movies, but their exposure to every type of worldly thought and conduct even during their formative years when they need to be grounded in Christian truth and trained for a Christian mode of life. Even while our children are attending a Christian day school, they will have ample contacts with others to bear witness to their faith. The thorough instruction and training they receive in Christian day schools can put them in a position to bear an effective witness with their conduct and attitudes and to maintain this Christian witness in their adult life when there will be everything else but isolation for them.

If this absence of isolation in the lives of our Lutheran school students was the case 55 years ago, it is even more true today in the age of the internet, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Christian education in our Lutheran schools will not shelter or isolate our children from the world. That is impossible in our day and age!

What an education in a Lutheran school will do for our children is give them some balance to the messages of the sinful world in which we live and provide them some strength of spirit in the face of the temptations they encounter every day of their lives. What's more, as the Lawrenz quote emphasis, education in a Lutheran school will form the witness of their Christian lives both as children and as adults.

A popular image in Lutheran schools in the past was the picture of Jesus taking up children in His arms, inspired by His words in Mark 10:13. Today let us continue to lead our little ones into the loving arms of our Lord and allow them to be taught His precious words of life and salvation.





### Tangy Cucumber and Avocado Salad

### From The Desk of Pastor Koen:

When Jesus taught His disciples to pray the Lord's Prayer, He told them this parable: Which of you who has a friend will go to him at midnight and say to him, 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him'; and he will answer from within, 'Do not bother me; the door is now shut, and my children are with me in bed. I cannot get up and give you anything'? The man eventually gave the friend what he needed because the friend was persistent.

When Jesus was teaching His disciples to pray, He also taught them to be persistent with their prayers. Don't give up, God is listening. He told them: "ask and it will be given to you; see, and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you."

When I was in the Seminary, my classmates would say to me when I would pray about something I needed: "move over for something is about to happen." I worked my way through college as well as through the Seminary. The cost back then was a challenge to meet. One day the Financial Director called me into his office to let me know that I had to come up with an enormous amount of money before the dead line or else I had to pack my bags and go home. I was quite distraught at the possibility of leaving the Seminary after being there for two years. I went into the Quad (center of the campus) that night in the middle of a storm and prayed to God, asking why He allowed me to come thus far with my Seminary training. I prayed to God persistently asking Him to open the doors for me to stay or to return to my home. My heart was truly torn apart. God was listening to my prayer.

The next day, the Financial Director called me to his office to let me know that a woman from Minnesota sent enough money for me to complete that second year. I have never forgotten that night, the gift God provided through that woman and the privilege of serving God these thirty years of ministry.

Jesus tells us: "For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened."

Take time to pray to God each day, He is waiting to hear from you. He will listen to what you have to say.
