### **Conquering Your Fear of Lack**

***The lions may grow weak and hungry, but those who seek the LORD lack no good thing. Psalms 34:10***

It's okay to grow up in poverty, as long as poverty doesn't grow up in you and control your thinking. One celebrity was asked how he felt about growing up in poverty. Amazingly, he confessed that he still suffered anxiety over having enough in the future. So he tended to be overly frugal, viewed his money as somewhat surreal, and wasn't able to relax and enjoy the blessings that come with success. However, his wife had brought balance to the relationship with the mindset of give, spend, and save. Who do you believe is responsible for your success, yourself or God? As long as you are, you'll remain vulnerable to people, circumstances, and economic conditions. But when you know God's responsible for your success, what you gain you can maintain. So your options are: trust yourself - or God! The psalmist writes: *'There is no want to those who truly revere and worship Him with godly fear. The young lions lack food and suffer hunger, but they who seek (inquire of and require) the Lord [by right of their*

need and on the authority of His Word], *none of them shall lack any beneficial thing'* (vv. 9-10). You say, 'But that's an Old Testament promise.' Then here's a New Testament one: *'God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work'* (2 Corinthians 9:8).

**Prayer:** *Heavenly Father, help me to trust You in what I have and what You provide. In Jesus' Name, Amen*

### **From the Pastors' Desks**

During this month that we celebrate our nation's independence and the personal freedom that we have as citizen's of this land, it is good to see that the U.S. Supreme Court recently ruled in favor of religious liberty.

The case, Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia (Missouri; where my sons who are students at the University of Missouri attend worship) vs Comer, involved the denial of a grant from the Missouri State Department of Natural Resources for the congregation to purchase scrap rubber to use as a base for its preschool playground.

The rationale for denying the grant, which was upheld by lower courts, is that this is a religious organization seeking a government benefit. The 7-2 majority opinion, written by Chief Justice John Roberts stated that the church was "asserting its right to participate in a government benefit program without having to disavow its religious character."

The grant was available to other non-profit organizations but was denied to Trinity solely because it is a church, even though the assistance had nothing to do with funding its Word and Sacrament ministry.

"The express discrimination against religious exercise here is not the denial of a grant, but rather the refusal to allow the church—solely because it is a church—to compete with secular organizations for a grant," wrote Roberts. The dissenting opinion of Justices Sotomayor and Ginsburg appealed to the history of church-state separation in our country. The ACLU is similarly "disappointed" in the decision.

In oral arguments justices noted that public services like fire and police protection are routinely given to houses of worship without constitutional harm. The majority decided that the church was asking only to compete for something with secular groups.

I am encouraged to see this as stemming the tide in our culture and government that is becoming increasingly hostile to faith organizations and people of

faith. The First Amendment of our country's constitution guarantees us "freedom of religion" not freedom from religion as many in our society now wish it to be.

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One of the first cars I had was a pink "58 Olds". It had electric seats and windows, an air conditioner that did not work and rode as smooth as some of the luxury cars of today. I had fun pulling up to a gas station and tell the attendant "to fill it up." The old timers knew where the gas cap was, but in most cases the younger ones could never figure out that they need to flip the tail light over to get to the gas cap.

During the Season of Pentecost, the pericopes (the weekly Scripture lessons) talk about the spiritual growth of the Church. God poured out His Spirit upon the apostles and the Church. They were "filled up" with the presence of the Holy Spirit who alone would guide and cause the Church to grow as the Word and sacraments were administered.

During the Season of Pentecost, God continues to work in our hearts filling us up with His presence. The Order of Service; the liturgy we use for worship, is called the "Divine Service." God comes to serve us, to "fill us up" as we receive His Word and Sacraments. As we listen to His Word He reminds us that His promises are fulfilled in His Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. As we live in our Baptism through daily confession of our sins, He fills us up with His absolution reminding us "**I forgive you your sins, go in peace.**" As we receive the Body and Blood of our Savior, our hearts and minds are strengthened, enabling us to live sanctified lives as God's children.

Sometimes our "spiritual tanks" can run low. That can happen when we abstain ourselves from worship each week, don't take time to read God's Word each day or to spend time in His Word while on vacation. God calls us to worship so that He can strengthen our spiritual life "fill us up" through His means of grace. This is one reason God commanded us to faithfully worship Him.

We need to remember that WE are His Church, His people. We are "**a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light.**" God calls us to come to Him fervently, frequently and faithfully to worship asking Him to "Fill'er up please"!





He also is survived by 22 grandchildren Rebekah, Sarah, Daniel, Hannah, Lydia, Christopher, Annie, Andrew, Kyle, Maxwell, Nicholas, William, Grace, Luke, Zachary, Jessica, Joshua, Jacob, Maria, Benjamin, Rachel, and Katie. The family is also blessed with one great-grandchild, Caitlyn, and another on the way. Other survivors include his siblings Milton Snyder, John (Gini) Snyder, and his sisters-in-law Anna Knuth and Theodora Wallace, a brother-in-law, Rev. Larry Meinzen, and well as many other nieces and nephews. In addition to his parents Ron was preceded in death by his sons James Snyder and Jonathan Snyder (in infancy).

Ron lived in Red Bud where he was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church. In May of 1955 he graduated from Concordia Teachers College in River Forest, Illinois, and was called to be Teacher at St. John's Lutheran Church and School in Red Bud. He continued his education at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis where he earned a Master of Arts Degree in Religion. He furthered his education by taking numerous courses at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. Ron faithfully served as a teacher and Principal at St. John's until his "retirement" in 1998. In that retirement Ron was a faithful substitute teacher at Christ Our Savior Lutheran High School, St. John's Lutheran School and Red Bud High School until his passing. He also was active at St. John's in the Choir, as a Bible class leader and in the

Men's Club. For many years Ron lifeguarded and managed the Red Bud Municipal Pool.

Ron was a loving husband, dedicated father and proud grandfather. He took great joy in his children's academic, music, and athletic accomplishments, but more importantly in his children's walk with Christ. He was an avid gardener. He had a keen sense of humor, and a quick wit. His thoughtful response when asked how he was doing was always, "I am content". As he joins his Heavenly Father his family and friends are sure, now more than ever, that this statement is true.

On Wednesday evening June 21 God fulfilled His baptismal promise to Ron and called him out of this earthly life into His heavenly presence. On Tuesday, June 27 we committed Ron's body to the ground in the certain hope of its resurrection to eternal life in Jesus Christ our Lord.

"Gratitude is one of the strongest and most transformative states of being. It shifts your perspective from lack to abundance and allows you to focus on the good in your life."

Being grateful is more important than you might think. Research by professors at Northeastern, Harvard, and the University of California at Riverside found that gratitude promotes patience and delayed gratification, which can boost savings."
