From Lutheran Church Charities How to Read the Bible

The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul; the testimony of the Lord is sure, making wise the simple; the precepts of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes. (Psalm 19:7-8)

Summer is a great time to develop a habit of daily Bible reading. How you approach reading the Bible is crucial. You must do two things: 1) Approach it with integrity. When a new Christian in a Bible study group said, 'I've had a hard time believing some parts of the Bible,' the others smiled and applauded. They didn't do it because unbelief is good news; they did it because he'd finally been honest enough to admit his doubts. Don't worry; God's not upset with you. Until you're willing to talk about your doubts, you can't resolve them.

When Thomas questioned the resurrection, Jesus showed up just to convince him. And He will show up for you too! It's a mistake to try to force yourself into believing something or avoid reading it so you don't get disturbed. Jesus said, 'When he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth...He will glorify me because it is from me that he will receive what he will make known to you' (John 16:13-14 NIV).

2) Read it with expectancy. Once you've been to a book signing, met the author and got his autograph, you feel very different about the book. You treasure it. And when you read the Bible with an expectant heart, the author shows up. As you read His words you begin to sense His presence and realize He is speaking to you personally. Jesus said, 'The Spirit gives life; the flesh counts for nothing. The words I have spoken to you – they are full of the Spirit and life' (John 6:63). When you come to the Scriptures with a hunger and an expectancy, you never go away disappointed.

Prayer- Heavenly Father, by Your Holy Spirit move me to spend time reading Your revealed and inspired Word of the Holy Bible that I may learn more of Your love for me in Jesus and how that love can work in me and through me for Your glory and the good of those around me. Amen.

We rightly celebrated the service of teachers who are retiring from active ministry, our principal, Mrs. Deitt Schneider, our 5th grade teacher, Mrs. Darlene Letcher, and our teacher aid, Mrs. Patty Schnepel. We thank them for their dedicated service to our Lord and His people here at St. John's.

Yet, we realized that in planning for their celebrations that we did not do something we did every year, that is, pre-Covid. We did not hold our annual Volunteer Recognition Luncheon. We certainly do appreciate the hard work of those many people who give of their personal time to make our ministry work at St. John's. They do so without any financial compensation, but with our heartfelt thanks. We can not do what we do without our dedicated volunteers.

Back to retirements. Today I heard a radio interview with a gerontologist who himself is in his 70s. He said that the average retired person watches 47 hours of television every week. (What is there on TV that is good enough to watch?) Also, he said that only 24% of retired people ever volunteer any of their time.

The average age of people is increasing. Those who now are 65 have a good chance of living into their 90s. Meanwhile, they are able to maintain their physical strength and mental health during many of those years. This should give that generation a chance to volunteer, to serve our Lord and His people as our Triune God has served them with His forgiveness, life and salvation.



LCMS Foundation

Two years ago, Marie's husband was called home to Jesus. Bud had always taken care of the financial matters: paying bills, investing, and planning for the future. They had been married for seventy years. Now, Marie was feeling overwhelmed. The financial planner kept calling, asking her permission to change investment strategies. The life insurance company regularly had calling teams contacting her, asking if she wanted to add to her coverage. The local bank kept sending mail asking her if she wanted to refinance the mortgage. The senior living representative she and Bud had met four years ago kept asking if she was ready to move into assisted living. The burden of these decisions was overwhelming. So, when her daughter asked her if she had reviewed her will lately, Marie became angry. "I just need everyone to leave me alone. Stop bugging me."

It is wise to do good planning while both spouses are alive. It is even better to make sure that those plans are written down, detailing an organized, planned approach to caring for the financial gifts God has placed in your care. It is unwise to expect that children or other relatives will be able to jump in, without any prior involvement, to make the same kind of choices you have chosen all your life. They will lovingly do their part, but you may be asking them to carry out a difficult or impossible task. Planning can bring peace of mind. When a good plan is in place, seeking interaction with professional legal, financial or tax advisors can be seen as continuing that plan. Asking children to help will also be part of that continuance.

What Is A Steward? From LCMS Stewardship

In the explanation of the Creed's First Article, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe. Luther says:

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me.

For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself, taking the form of a servant. Luther writes:

"(Jesus) has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Luther explains:

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. But how easy is this for us to forget about this? How easy is it for us to think that what we have in this life is because we have earned it? How easy is it for us to forget that even all our skills, the abilities of our hands and minds – the very ethic to work diligently and to seek to get better at these skills – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said? How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone – and the work of the Holy Spirit – that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and not our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing. But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven, not to earn anything but in response to what He has accomplished for us. A person cannot receive one thing unless it is given to him from heaven. Everything we have, and everything we are — in both body and soul — are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks us to — with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.
