

For Your Devotions

Skeptics sometimes respond to an invitation to attend Christian worship with this criticism: "There are too many hypocrites in churches." My cynical reaction is to say, "There is always room for one more." But the better answer is that we are here not because we are so good, but because we are sinners in need of a Savior. The following recent devotion from Lutheran Church Charities addresses how we should react to failures from our church leaders and faults in our families of faith:

Love Your Church—Jesus Does!

Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her Ephesians 5:25

The church isn't made up of people who are better than everybody else. It's made up of people who want to be better than they are, and who know that by the grace of God they can be. Have church leaders sometimes failed us? Yes, but Jesus Christ, the Head of the church, hasn't failed us—and He never will! Christ's church, of which your local church is a part, was planned by God before the world began (Ephesians 1:4). It was paid for in the crimson cash of Jesus' blood, has been sustained through history by the sacrifice of the martyrs, is prophesied to be more glorious in its ending than its beginning, and is being prepared right now as a bride for

her Husband. John of Revelation describes it this way: 'Rejoice and give Him glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and His wife has made herself ready' (Revelation 19:7). So before you attack the leadership, withdraw your membership, or withhold your stewardship, remember that nothing on earth is dearer to the heart of God than His church. The truth is, when you hurt any part of the body you also hurt the Head. And here's something else to keep in mind: the only thing on earth that has a future is the church; all the rest is going up in smoke. And the church's insurance policy is guaranteed by Jesus Himself, Who said, 'I will build My church; and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it' (Matthew 16:18). So love your church—Jesus does!

While a congregation can come up with gimmicks, programs and guilt trips to squeeze money out of selfish people, a thankful person gives willingly and without the ulterior motive of getting something in return.

Verse 17b: "And now I have seen with joy how willingly Your people who are here have given to You."

People will follow the good examples of their leaders. They knew of David's commitment to the Lord through his gifts. They have imitated his actions.

To whom did the people give their gifts?

What one word describes David's response when he sees their gifts to the Lord?

Verse 18: "O Lord, God of our fathers Abraham, Isaac and Israel, keep this desire in the hearts of Your people forever, and keep their hearts loyal to You."

Notice the connection David makes in his prayer to the heritage of his people. They were not the first generation of God's believers (nor will they be the last). God had been working the wonders of His love among their ancestors for centuries. What we have today in our congregation has been handed down to us by the sweat and sacrifice of saints of God here over the previous 16 decades. We dare not drop the ball in our generations by losing the desire for the Lord that they displayed.

From the Pastors' Desks

We recently celebrated the college graduations of our daughters Mary from the University of Missouri in Columbia and Chelsea from Concordia University-Wisconsin. While we were in Milwaukee, we went on a tour of the Pabst Mansion. It is the last of such homes built by the city's elites in the late 1800s. (There were no free samples in the house. There are also no free samples in this newsletter article. Sorry!)

Frederick Pabst emigrated from Germany to Chicago with his family as a boy. At age 14 he began work as a deckhand on a Lake Michigan steamship. By age 21 he became a ship's captain. During his ten years of doing this he met and married his wife whose father owned Best Brewery in Milwaukee.

Pabst and his brother-in-law bought the business and then Pabst took it over by himself after their father-in-law died. He gave the beer his family name. When it won first place at the Chicago World's Fair in 1893 he began calling it "Pabst Blue Ribbon Beer."

In 1890 he had this house built with the latest innovations of the day (indoor plumbing, electric lights, telephone, intercom system) with ten bedrooms and bathrooms and a first floor dedicated to entertaining. The projected cost of \$75,000 turned into a \$254,000 house.

In one corner of the first floor was his study, his version of today's "man cave." There he smoked cigars, drank wine (which he preferred over beer), and stored his books and papers in cabinets with secret latches. The

ceiling is the highlight of this room. He had worked into the oak wood his favorite German proverbs:

Learn: a feeling heart suffers pain

Strive: Bread eaten with thankfulness inspires a joyful heart.

Honor: Never have I found anything more priceless than a quiet and true heart.

Wait: Never soft, never loud what a friend has told you in confidence.

On his desk in that study is the original copy of a letter Pabst wrote to his surviving children (four out of ten) on how they should act after his death:

"Be generous and unselfish to each other in case of need, and above all, be honest and noble in all your dealings, not only with each other, but with the world.

I want you always to have a good name. It is better than riches, and your greatest happiness will come from your knowledge of doing right.

You must first of all be good to your mother. Do all you can to make her last days her best days.

Like many of our Lutheran ancestors, Pabst was from the Saxony region of Germany. His house sits across the street from a Lutheran church (ELCA). So I wondered if perhaps he had been a Lutheran. I asked the tour guide about his religious faith. She said they were dedicated Christians, but that they did not claim any denominational affiliation.

Though his sentiments do not quote Scripture, they do give evidence of the natural knowledge of God and His will for our lives that He places into each of our consciences. I would have liked the chance to enjoy a glass of wine and a cigar in Captain Pabst's study and to have talked about the Christian faith with him.

"I will speak of your statues before kings, O Lord, and will not be put to shame." (Introit Presentation of the Augsburg Confession, Psalm 119:46).

485 years ago on June 25, 1530 The Augsburg Confession was read before Emperor Charles V at the Diet of Augsburg. This day marked the beginning of the Church of that time returning to the truth of God's Word. Martin Luther called the Diet of Augsburg "the last trumpet before Judgment Day."

The Presentation of the Augsburg Confession changed the world. Some have suggested that the Presentation of the Augsburg Confession is as important as when Luther nailed the Ninety-five Theses on the castle door in Wittenberg in 1517. It was written by

Philipp Melanchthon and approved by Martin Luther. The Augsburg Confession was read in German, not Latin, on June 25th by Chancellor Beyer. The Electors and Princes of the Holy Roman Empire, known as Germany today, signed the Augsburg Confession. George of Brandenburg declared, "Rather than deny my God and suffer the Word of God to be taken from me, I will kneel down and have my head struck off." Although the German princes who signed the Augsburg Confession did not lose their heads, others would lose their heads.

God blessed His Church as He led Luther and others to the truth of His Word. Many of them were willing to give up their lives rather than submitting to the heresies being taught by the Church of the time.

The Presentation of the Augsburg Confessions is a reminder to us to faithfully teach the truth of God's Word.
