"God's Remedy for Depression"

According to the Counselling Directory, one in 10 people are affected by depression at some point in their lives, with up to 10 times more people suffering from depression now than in 1945. And most of them won't reach for assistance because they believe depression is a personal weakness. Now, let's make an important distinction here. If you're clinically depressed it could be due to a chemical imbalance in your body, and a doctor can help you. But the Bible can help. If you're feeling sad or hopeless, it provides wisdom on how to recover. Your situation won't be solved with a few clichés or a good pick-me-up lecture from a friend. What you need is *'the wisdom that is from above'* (James 3:17).

After calling down fire from heaven, Elijah *'sat down...and prayed that he might die'* (1 Kings 19:4). Fortunately, he turned to the right source. *'All at once an angel touched him and said, "Get up"'* (1 Kings 19:5). Now, God may not send you an angel, but He will answer you, lift and restore you. The psalmist said: *'Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise Him, my Savior*

and my God.' Who is the Psalmist talking to? Himself! First, he talked to God about his problem; that's what you do in prayer. Next, he listened to God about his problem; that's what you do when you read the Scriptures and speak them over your life. That strategy works. It worked for the Psalmist – and it will work for you too.

Prayer- Heavenly Father, depression can happen to anyone, including me. Move me in my need to seek You through Your Word of the Holy Bible. Thank You for those people that You place into my life for my assistance during times of my depression. In Jesus' name. Amen.

Guitar Player(s) Wanted

Every 3rd Sunday of each month during the 10:30 service, St. John's has its monthly Alternative Service. This is printed order of worship with a mild blending of Lutheran liturgy with modern music and different instruments. So far, the instruments we have are keyboard, bass guitar, and drums, but we are looking to add a guitar to the mix! We are looking for the following qualifications:

Guitar player must have their own instrument (either acoustic or electric) and be able to bring it to and from church. Instrument must have an appropriate audio hook-up connection in order to be plugged into the church's sound system. Musician can bring their own audio cable if desired, but it is not necessary as the church has some.

Guitar player must be able to play sufficiently by ear or by reading sheet music, a leadsheet, or a guitar chord chart. Guitar player must be able to learn a set-list of (usually) 7 songs per service in 1-2 week timeframe. If the songs take longer to learn (say 3-4 weeks), let me know. I will provide sheet music and audio files in a timely matter so that the musician will have enough time to practice and prepare.

Guitar player must be able to start practice no later than 9:30 AM on the day of playing. Practice usually takes 30-45 minutes. The service itself usually runs about an hour (as there is usually no Communion.) The following dates are scheduled Alternative Services for the rest of 2020: June 21st, July 19th, August 16th, September 20th, October 18th, November 15th, and December 20th.

What Is A Steward? *From LCMS Stewardship*

The sin of the world is paid for. God's Law has been kept perfectly on our behalf. The prophecies have all been fulfilled. Jesus Christ has finished it all! And that, dear Christians, should fill us with complete confidence in our salvation. Since Jesus has finished all these things in His self-sacrifice, we can be fully certain our sins are forgiven, and we have everlasting life!

St. Paul wrote: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (Rom. 12:1)

We hear the same teaching in 1 Peter. "As you come to him, a living stone, rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves, like living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:4-5)

It is the very thing Malachi foretold of the Lord, that He would come and purify His priestly people, that they may offer to Him an offering in righteousness. (Mal. 3:3)

So, what does this mean? In view of God's mercies – that is, because Jesus sacrificed Himself to make us pure, giving His entire self into death – Paul said that we are to sacrifice ourselves entirely to God, offering Him our whole lives. For our Savior did not give Himself for us in part. So, we do not give back to Him in part.

We don't offer ourselves to God just on Sunday mornings or Wednesday evenings, for example. Rather, we give Him our whole selves, all the time. We understand that offering ourselves to God as living sacrifices involves the giving of our time. It requires us to be faithful stewards of the time He has given us. Yes, it means we devote to our Savior all our time. Otherwise we are not sacrificing our whole lives.

You see, God both teaches us, and has graciously qualified us, to present ourselves to Him as living sacrifices – to live as His holy priests, who offer Him acceptable sacrifices through Jesus Christ, all day, every day, in our various callings.

In the passages from Romans and 1 Peter, we hear several examples of Christian self-sacrifice: serving, teaching, encouraging, giving, leading, showing mercy, living peaceably with others, submitting to governing authorities and those over us in the workplace, wives submitting to husbands, husbands honoring wives, showing compassion, and suffering patiently in doing good.

In all these things, and in all our other everyday activities, we sacrifice ourselves by using our time, not just for our own benefit, but also and especially for the well-

being of others. Work time, school time, exercise time, study time, mealtime, chore time, recreation and relaxation time, even sleep time – it's all God's gift to us to use for purposes that please and honor Him.

This challenges us to think about the way we spend our time, how we utilize our talents, and the way we spend our treasures. Whatever it is I'm doing, am I doing it "for the Lord"? (Col. 3:23) Am I presenting God a living sacrifice? Am I conducting myself as a holy priest, whose sacrifice is acceptable to God?

Because our Lord sacrificed Himself wholly for us, we offer ourselves wholly to Him as living sacrifices. This is following Jesus in self-sacrifice. By His saving mercy, yes, our sacrifice is acceptable to God. For the sake of Jesus' finished work, God is pleased with us.

From the Principal's Pen

Yesterday, May 27, was our official last day of school. No closing Chapel service was held, no awards presented, no picnic or games being played, no 8th grade students having a frozen shirt race, watermelon eating contest or tug of war. A gift of a yard sign was given to the 8th grade graduates from me while the teachers and staff held a parade to visit all the students. It was a great day, seeing everyone, students, parents and grandparents. Other students along the route waved and were happy to reconnect, even at a distance! We all realize how much we miss each other!

While other schools have held virtual graduations, we were holding off in the hopes of having an in church service as done in the past. With no clear decision being made as to when Churches may reopen, we will hold a drive-in service on June 5 with a rain date of June 12 starting at 7 PM. We will stay socially distant as families will stay in their cars. We will use the fellowship hall back porch as our stage and have pictures taken by Erica Mollet so all parents will have a wonderful photograph capturing the occasion. The service will be on Face book also. Yes, this has never been done before and I know we would prefer going back to our normal way of doing things. We will make the best of our situation.

A very positive and exciting change has happened at school “while you were gone”! The students will have a bright new ceiling, lights and fans in the 1970 addition to the school plus the K-5th grade hallway! The rooms look fantastic, so bright and clean! The old ceilings were 50 years old, dull and water stained from occasional roof leaks. Now, they look great and make the rooms feel new again! There have been several people working on this project so a list will be published later but a big thank you goes to John Preston and other trustees for making this happen! All the volunteers allow us to make improvements and we thank the PTL and supporters of the dinner auction for paying for the materials. Thank you, God has blessed us through you!

We hope to have a list of all year awards included in the Epistle. We are experiencing some computer issues so we may have to publish those at a later date.

We have scheduled Registration/Book night for July 8. At this point we hope to host it as in the past. We will let you know if we need to make other arrangements because of social distancing. A list of costs was sent home to school families and is included in the Epistle.

I hope you have used your time at home well during this pandemic. I have enjoyed not having evening meetings and it is nice not driving home late at night. I have read many books which I never had time for before the shut down. Even cooking is happening more often as I am home to do it and I am not rushed to hurry up and make something! So, I hope you have enjoyed spending time with your family; I appreciate these little things in life.

I will close with the verse the class of 2020 chose for their class verse: “For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope.” Jeremiah 29:11
