"For a wide door for effective work has opened to me, and there are many adversaries." 1 Corinthians 16:9

One day the Chamber of Commerce in a small town invited a successful businessman to come and speak. The local economy was bad and they were discouraged, so his job was to motivate them. He took a large piece of white paper and made a red dot in the center of it. 'What do you see?' he asked the audience. One person replied, 'I see a red dot.' The speaker said, 'Fine, but what else do you see?' Others chimed in, 'A red dot.' The speaker asked, 'Don't you see anything else besides the dot?' The audience responded with a resounding 'no!' The speaker said, 'You've overlooked the most important thing; you've missed seeing the sheet of paper!' Then he went on to explain that in life we are often distracted by small, dot-like failures and experiences. Your Pastors' Ponderings

In the past, the members of St John's have experienced their pastors leaving to serve in other churches, or fallen asleep in Jesus while serving this congregation. Guitar Player(s) Wanted

Every 3rd Sunday of each month during the 10:30 service, St. John's has its monthly Alternative Service. This is printed order of worship with a mild blending of Lutheran liturgy with modern music and different instruments. So far, the instruments we have are keyboard, bass guitar, and drums, but we are looking to add a guitar to the mix! We are looking for the following qualifications:

Guitar player must have their own instrument (either acoustic or electric) and be able to bring it to and from church. Instrument must have an appropriate audio hook-up connection in order to be plugged into the church's sound system. Musician can bring their own audio cable if desired, but it is not necessary as the church has some.

Guitar player must be able to play sufficiently by ear or by reading sheet music, a leadsheet, or a guitar chord chart. Guitar player must be able to learn a set-list of (usually) 7 songs per service in 1-2 week timeframe. If the songs take longer to learn (say 3-4 weeks), let me know. I will provide sheet music and audio files in a timely matter so this musician will have time to practice and prepare.

Guitar player must be able to start practice no later than 9:30 a.m. on the day of playing. Practice usually takes 30-45 minutes. The service itself usually runs about an hour (usually no Communion.) These dates are Alternative Services for the rest of 2020: July 19th, August 16th, Sept. 20th, October 18th, November 15th, and December 20th.

What Is A Steward? From LCMS Stewardship

"Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And the ruler replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." (Luke 18:18–22)

As we listen to this, one question is raised in our minds: Is Jesus speaking to us also or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor? As good Lutherans, we answer: No! But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor?

The simplest explanation is this: If we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't mean it isn't to be used for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family, and society. We are members of all three of these by birth.

- We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from either our birth into the church or the birth of others by Baptism into it.
- We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from either our birth into that family or the birth of others into our family.
- We are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are is to be used into service for the church, the family, and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and our duties toward them would falter.

Consider your life and what you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help society. You provide food, clothing, and shelter for the members of your family. You save for college for your children.

But the one station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits – the best from off the top – even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought and intent. It means that you sit down and make a plan for what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems there are other more immediate and pressing things.

This is more necessary now as we enter into periods of time while giving is low due to high unemployment or restrictions on meeting in church to give. Loving God, His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace we receive at church and only at church, then we will support the church just as we love our country and our family.

For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious and giving God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son into death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What is more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of the church, the family, and society, are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three by birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be ignored or even an afterthought. The church is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation by Word and Sacrament for eternal life.
