“Thou, O King, Art the Most Worthy”

*That at the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow, in
heaven, on earth and under the earth.* Philippians 2:10

During one of the crusades, Philippe Auguste, king of France, assembled all his noble knights and encouraged them to be strong in battle. On the table he placed his royal crown, bearing the inscription ‘To the most worthy’, and pledged it as a prize to be given to the bravest fighter. After the army went to battle and returned victorious, they encircled the table where the crown sat. Then one of the nobles stepped forward, lifted the crown, and placed it on the king’s head, saying, ‘Thou, O king, art the most worthy.’

The Bible says, ‘Every knee will bow to the name of Jesus – everyone in heaven, on earth, and under the earth. And everyone will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord’ (vv. 10-11). Note the words ‘every knee will bow’. In 2011, the population reference bureau estimated that 106 billion people had been born since the dawn of the human race. Guess what? Every single one of them will bow to the name of Jesus. Try to imagine all those people – over ten times the world’s population – kneeling before Christ and

saying, ‘Thou, O king, art most worthy.’ And in that moment Christ will assume His position ‘*far above all rule and authority and power and dominion...not only in this age but also in the one to come*’ (Ephesians 1:21). Then He, the author and finisher of it all, will close the book on this life and open the book on the next. That’s the beginning of the unending story that we, the redeemed of the Lord, wait for and long for.

Prayer- Heavenly Father, I long for that day when every knee will bow in honor to Your Son Jesus, whom we now bow to in worshipful faith as our Lord and Savior from sin. In His name, Amen.

Your Pastor’s Ponderings

The Son of God from all eternity took upon Himself our human life with all its limitations, needs, weaknesses and suffering. Then on the cross He willingly, lovingly, and completely took upon Himself our human sins which cause our human death. But His death was as our substitute. His death was as our sacrifice. His death was as our Savior from sin and Defender from the devil.

During His earthly ministry the point of Jesus’ words and the purpose of Jesus’ works was to show that He is true God and the eternal Son of the Almighty Lord. This is the theme of John’s gospel, that Jesus is the Son of God and the authorized agent of our heavenly Father.

This is a truth of divinity, a teaching of Scripture, a doctrine of Christianity, and a mystery of the faith; that is the oneness, the unity, the fullness of the one God who is also the three Persons of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This is not an equation for us to solve mathematically. It is not a union for us to understand intellectually. It is not a proposition for us to prove argumentatively. But this is a clear revelation of the Holy Bible, it is a firm faith from Holy Bible, and it is a constant claim in Holy Bible.

Many in this world cannot accept either the Bible’s teaching of the Holy Trinity or of the divine and human natures of Jesus Christ. This includes the Mormons and the Jehovah’s Witnesses. What does not make sense to their minds cannot be part of their faith.

So also was it with Jesus’ first hearers among the Jewish leaders. They could not accept that Jesus of Nazareth is also the eternal Son of God. For what they considered blasphemy they arrested Jesus. But it was His mission on earth to be betrayed into hands of sinful men, to suffer, and to die in our place and on account of our sins to win for us God’s forgiveness of those sins. During this Lenten season we follow Jesus on His journey to Jerusalem, to Gethsemane, to Calvary, and to death.

Yet, those very wounds are the means by which our sins are forgiven and we are made whole again. This worship series for the season of Lent leads us to reflect on how the wounds of sin affect relationships with God and with others and how, through graceful healing, our Lord restores us once more."

The evening services are preceded at 5:45 p.m. and following by a meal in the Fellowship Hall provided by Mr. Becker and served by our Senior Youth. There also will be a hymn sing in the sanctuary before worship.

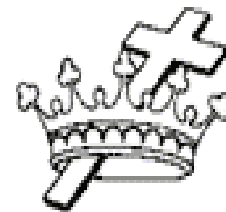

What Is A Steward? *From LCMS Stewardship*

Hudson Taylor, nineteenth-century British missionary to China, is reported to have said, "God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word. Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2nd Corinthians 10:5). Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly

hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life-giving, faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to give thanks for His daily provision of it. God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned on the mount of the Lord it will be provided. The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return.

Thus, we set aside for the work of God a generous, first-fruits, proportion of the daily bread that God has given to us. This act of trust in the Lord's provision is the working out of our faith in Him. When budgetary discussions pop up our natural reaction is to point fingers. But remember your doctrine, and what your mother taught about pointing fingers. Our first natural reaction is not always right. In fact, when our thoughts are brought into captivity of Christ, our first reaction should be repentance. It should raise questions in our own lives. As good trees in Christ who are to bear good fruit, we should ask whether our thoughts have been taken captive by obedience to Christ. Have we given generously? Have we given our first-fruits? You know. And God knows. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron 16:9).

God will provide. He always has and He always will. He gives His meat in due season. He has not left you as orphans but has grafted you into His own family. You belong to Him. Remember this, letting this thought dwell in you richly. And you will then be rich toward others.

St. Paul wrote in Galatians 3, "*So whatever you do, whether in word or deed, DO IT ALL in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, giving thanks to God the Father through Him.*" That perspective reflects a heart captured by God's grace, intent on sharing that grace with everyone. Through His gifts God's saves with His Gospel.

Synod & District Conventions Delayed

Due to Covid-19 restrictions in many states which would prevent districts from gathering in convention this year, the LCMS put out a vote on whether to postpone the synodical convention from 2022 to 2023, enabling districts to hold their conventions next year. More than the required one-fourth (63.32%) of the Synod's member congregations registered a vote, and the majority (90.67%) of votes cast

favored adoption. The stated extension of the 2019–2022 triennium by a year, allowing district conventions to take place in either 2021 or 2022 and deferring the national Synod convention from 2022 to 2023, is therefore adopted.

Set Up Direct Payments Thru ACH

Routine payments to St. John's can be made by direct electronic withdrawal for offerings, school lunches, preschool tuition, and daycare securely from the bank account you designate at either bi-weekly or monthly intervals.
