Jesus, Our Example

Psalm 116:12, 17-19 – What shall I render to the LORD for all His benefits to me? I will offer You the sacrifice of thanksgiving and call on the Name of the LORD. I will pay my vows to the LORD in the presence of all His people, in the courts of the house of the LORD, in your midst, O Jerusalem. Praise the LORD!

A Spanish scholar and man of letters tells an interesting story about an old Roman aqueduct at Segovia, Spain. The aqueduct was built in the year 109 of our era. For 18 centuries it carried cool water from the mountains down to the thirsting city. Then aqueducts went out of style. Modern pipelines were laid, and the old aqueduct was retired. It was no longer to do any work but was merely to be preserved as an historic landmark of interest to future generations. Almost immediately the aqueduct began to fall apart. The sun shone on the dry mortar, and it crumbled; stones were loosened and began to fail. A few years of idleness ruined what 18 centuries of service could not destroy.

As the ancient psalmist thought of God's bountiful goodness and of all the blessings God had showered upon him, he expressed a desire to make a sacrifice for God. He asks, "What shall I render to the Lord for all His benefits to me?" As we think of the goodness of God and of all the spiritual blessings that are ours in Christ the Savior; —faith, courage, and hope; forgiveness of sins, and life everlasting; —we, too, will want to bring a sacrifice for Christ.

There are so many things each of us has to offer others in the service of Christ and the church. We may bring major skills like career expertise or our ability to put things together — and these are wonderful ways in which to serve. Or we have simpler —but no less significant things; —like our ears to listen to someone's pain, our words to console a worried and anxious heart, or our hand to reach out and put on someone's shoulder. These are vital connections. These are things we can all do; —just as Jesus did for us.

Look at what Christ did for us; —because He loved us; —long before we learned to love Him. As the hymn, "Christ's Dying Love," written by Isaac Watts, says, "How condescending and how kind was God's eternal Son! Our misery reached His heavenly mind, and our pity brought Him down."

Jesus came, not to be served, but to serve. He came, not to get, but to give. He sacrificed His life so that in Him we might have eternal life. Think of it! God Himself suffered and died in shame and disgrace for our eternal salvation, before we had ever been born! Indeed, what shall we render to the Lord?

WE PRAY: Heavenly Father, through Jesus, You saved us to serve others. Let us not be idle in this pursuit. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.



FROM PASTOR MARK

Last month, all of those going through the Bible Recap read the book of Job. For some it may have been the first time ever reading it, but even for those who've read it multiple times I'm sure they came away with a new understanding or deeper wisdom. This is because one of the Bible's greatest wisdom books is the book of Job. So, I felt it appropriate to dive into this book and was excited to see that Rev. Dr. Reed Lessing (*who has preached here before and taught me Hebrew at Concordia Seminary*) has put together a Lenten program from the book of Job. Therefore, this Lent we are going to explore this magnificent composition that is numbered among some of the greatest literature of all time. **Nine sermons will help us dig deeply into Job's central message and supporting truths**, while six Sunday Morning Adult Bible Classes will further address the book's major topics and themes.

We all suffer—personally and privately. We also suffer in more public ways, especially with social media. A husband loses a job. A child gets divorced. A parent dies. And also, thanks now to our ever-connected worldwide media, we are able to see and experience more and more of the world's catastrophes and suffering, sometimes feeling like we are right there with them. **We need the book of Job, now, more than ever.**

Martin Luther asserted that **“Job is magnificent and sublime as no book of Scripture.”** Others have called Job “the Shakespeare of the Bible.” Yet the early Christian scholar Jerome perhaps put it best when he called **the book of Job an “eel,”** since the more one tries to contain it, the slipperier it becomes! The purpose of our Lenten emphasis is to learn how to apply Job to our lives, so that the book becomes less like an eel and more like a loving companion through life's dark valleys. So plan to join us every Wednesday at 6:30pm (starting February 18th) as we walk through this magnificent book. The preaching plan is as follows:

Lent 1, “Sweet Surrender” (Job 1:13–21)

Lent 2, “Learning to Lament” (Job 3:1–26)

Lent 3, “It is Enough” (Job 14:1–14)

Lent 4, “Understanding How it all Works Together”
(Job 23:1–17)

Lent 5, “God Speaks in the Storm” (Job 38:1–11)

Palm Sunday, “On Earth is not his Equal!”
(Job 41:20–34)

Good Friday, “Tearing Down the Spite House”
(Job 42:7–9)

The Resurrection of Our Lord, “I Know that My Redeemer Lives!” (Job 19:23–26)

Job's most famous statement appears in 19:25, **“I know that my Redeemer lives.”** *Christ is alive.* He has conquered death and the grave. His Word is sufficient. His grace is enough. His love brings comfort and healing. And this Lent these gifts come to us through the book of Job. So, if you've never read Job, or if you have not read it in a while, then I encourage you to pick up your Bible and read through it as we prepare to dive in this Lent.

“I have a question for you. Have you ever read through all the paragraphs in your will? I did recently on a rainy afternoon when there was nothing else to do and I had no idea I ever signed a document that addressed so many topics.” Those words were shared with Rita by her friend Rene. Rita responded, “I find legal documents and estate issues so complicated. I’m glad I can have someone else lead me through that challenge.”

Sometimes we may think that an estate plan is simply a will, a trust and a couple of POA documents and that the fees an attorney charges for that stack of papers is too expensive. However, an estate plan is more than just a stack of yellowing papers. The plan comes out of discussion, prayer, and thinking, discerning how God wants you to distribute the things He has entrusted to your care once He calls you home to Jesus. The real value of the estate plan is found in the plan, not just in some documents. It takes some work to create that plan.

Many don’t know where to get started in creating their first plan or reviewing an old plan, so they take no action at all. Your LCMS Foundation Gift Planning Counselor can help you get started. It begins with organizing your pertinent information. It continues with honing the goals you have, not just for family inheritance but support of ministry as well. Then clear information can be shared with your attorney, so they can draft documents that take into consideration legal concerns, making sure your goals are on paper and will be respected and accomplished someday. Table of Duties: The Forgotten Stewardship Tool

Luther's Small Catechism is a magnificent tool. Joined with a well-used copy of the Holy Scriptures and an orthodox hymnal, and the Christian is well equipped to live a life of faithfulness to the Lord and service to the neighbor. First in German and now in English and just about any language known to man, this handy masterpiece has introduced generations of people to the central doctrine of justification by grace, through faith, on account of Jesus Christ. The Six Chief Parts have proven to be a faithful framework for a clear confession of the truth of the Gospel for nearly five hundred years!

But more than a textbook, the Small Catechism also serves well as a handbook for Christian living. As a part of its treasure, there is an element that teaches an extraordinarily strong message of stewardship. That hidden treasure that needs to be rediscovered is called the Table of Duties.

The Table of Duties is really nothing more than a categorized gathering of Bible verses. These verses are set apart for "various holy orders and positions, admonishing them about their duties and responsibilities." Addressing pastors and people, government and citizens, husbands, wives, children, youth, workers and so many more, it very clearly lays out what faithful stewardship looks like. Even better, these assembled passages teach one important truth: we are stewards of one another!

The Table is much more than a "how-to" tool; it also lays out the interconnectedness that exists within the body of Christ. Pastors are described by what they are to be as stewards of the Word. 1 Timothy 3 highlights the characteristics of a faithful pastor. Even more, Titus 1 highlights the need for the pastor to be faithful for the sake of those under his care.

Those who hear the faithful preaching of the pastor are stewards of the pastor as well. 1 Corinthians 9 talks about the need for the people to support the livelihood of the pastor. Galatians 6 talks about how the hearers share in the good things that the pastor teaches. 1 Timothy 6 talks about the honor that is owed to the pastor, not because of WHO he is, but rather WHAT he is teaching! Hebrews 13 shows the impact of this stewardship on the pastor, that they perform their duties with joy. Joyful pastors and people are always going to be better stewards of the Gospel!

Outside the church, this interdependent stewardship is on display as well. Romans 13 highlights the respect necessary for the governing authorities. As citizens, the faithful steward is called to pay taxes (Matthew 22), pray for their leaders (1 Timothy 2) and that they should be ready to serve in the civil realm (Titus 3), because they are in these positions by God's direction (1 Peter 2).

These steward duties are in the home too! 1 Peter 3 and Colossians 3 shape the husband steward. Ephesians 5 and 1 Peter 3 shape the wife steward. Ephesians 6 form parental stewards and child stewards.

The Table of Duties is a wonderful place for the individual steward to learn how much our stewardship is more than just a "me and Jesus thing!" In fact, it ends with these words: "Let each his lesson learn with care, and all the household well share fare." This is interdependent stewardship on clear display. As each learns stewardship in this way, the more faithful we will be as a family, congregations, communities and the church at large.
