And Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness for forty days, being tempted by the devil. ... And when the devil had ended every temptation, he departed from Him until an opportune time. (Luke 4:1-2a, 13)

I'm not surprised Jesus' ministry began with temptation. After all, it ended the same way; —with the devil speaking through the people who mocked Him, tempting Jesus to use His power to come down from the cross.

Here Jesus faces a whole bunch of temptations; — and if you look closely, every one of them is a way to get out of His future suffering and death. Turn stone into bread? Yes, and You can feed the people miraculously forever! They will follow You anywhere! No need for the cross.

What about jumping off the temple, only to be saved by angels? Well, everybody likes a good show. And to be sure, such a display would make the Romans think twice before they took on an earthly king who had obvious divine power. Again, no need for the cross; —take David's throne and call it good. But what about the worst one; —where the devil offers Jesus all the kingdoms of

the world and their glory; —all for the low, low price of worshipping Satan?

Not a chance. Jesus would never dishonor the Father He loved that way. Nor would He risk us, even for a moment, by doing anything other than what the Father had given Him to do; —to lay down His life for us on the cross and then take it up again on Easter morning.

WE PRAY: Lord Jesus, You loved us enough to stay faithful when it was hardest. Thank You. Amen.

FROM THE DESK OF REV. MARK WINKELMAN

"I have so much to do that I shall spend the first three hours in prayer." ~Martin Luther

Oh, to have such a high view of prayer! Of our relationship with God! Can you imagine saying this as you begin a new day? Too often, we do not view prayer with such importance; wait, no, that's not right. We NEVER view prayer with such importance as to say everything else must wait while I go pray. I am guilty of this very thing. I've been called to pray for you - Acts 6:4 says the first Apostles devoted themselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word. Somehow the ministry of the word is the easy part! To care for the members by administering the Word and Sacraments whether in worship or in times of need comes easier than setting aside time to pray for those same members.

I know I'm not alone in this. The battle takes place in prayer. Sure, it can be easy to say a word or two to God while we're going about our day - as we're driving we ask God for protection, when our thoughts land upon a loved one we lift them up to God, etc.; but to intentionally set aside time is a real struggle. When we set aside time for prayer, Satan goes to work. He'll work to make you think you're too busy or to think the calendar is more important. He'll create distractions or whisper things to interrupt your thoughts. Have you ever closed your eyes in prayer and immediately started thinking about your to-do list? Supper plans, grocery lists, laundry, phone calls, texts, emails, it goes on and on and each seemingly more important and more urgent than prayer. Our flesh is weak, our thoughts stray, Satan annoys and soon we find ourselves off and going without really praying. (*For this issue I suggest a prayer journal - write down your prayers, and when thoughts interrupt write those on a notepad for later and go back to praying, trust me when I say the list will be endless*).

So, is prayer important? Well, Jesus often went off alone to pray. At the Last Supper Jesus prayed a lengthy prayer, for us (John 17). Later that night, before He was arrested, He was in the Garden of Gethsemane praying...and praying so long the disciples kept falling asleep; He returned after 1 hour and said, "So you

couldn't keep awake with Me one hour! Stay awake and pray" (Matthew 26:40). Jesus was so busy saving the world that He spent multiple hours in prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane.

We are not Jesus, as made obvious by the disciples own inability to stay awake. We are not tasked with saving the world from sin. However, we are each given neighbors to love and serve. So, we can all see the importance of prayer. The group of men who have joined Memento are battling to pray and lead a more disciplined life for their families, church, and community. This is no easy task; Satan does not want to see such a life lived. It is my hope that we all go to battle together in prayer, lifting up St. John's Church & School. We have so many blessings from God to share with one another and with our community that we must spend hours in prayer. May the Lord bless our prayers and break and hinder every plan of Satan that would prevent us from praying.

Finally, if you find yourself struggling to pray I suggest opening our hymnal to pages 295-318. There you will find daily prayers and written prayers for many and various circumstances in life. The Lutheran Service Book is a wonderful resource for us Christians. This Lenten season I pray we all find time for more prayer and Bible reading (which I am so pleased to hear many continue to do and encourage others to join with!). May God bless you and your prayers.

As a kid, I remember my Grandma and Grandpa Diepholz' home with extraordinary joy. Family fun. Great food. A legacy of faith. One of my lasting memories of that house was the table that sat between their twin beds. It contained a lamp, a Bible, a catechism and a hymnal. These were well-worn, as Grandpa read to Grandma every night before they went to sleep! What a treasure these tools of faith are! Let us spend some time this month in the hymnal to help us better understand our life as Christian stewards! To do this, we will use LSB 785 "We Praise You, O God."

Stewardship is an act of worship. It flows from the grace and mercy we have received in Jesus! Faithful stewardship can never start with us. Our sinful nature will make us and our desires the center of our worship. Our

tributes, our giving and our serving only flow from how the Lord Jesus has given of Himself for our sake!

When we have this in clear view, our knees bow and our praises flow freely! All this flows from the Name that has been placed on us in Holy Baptism!

We worship You, God of our Fathers, we bless You; Through trial and tempest our guide You have been.

When perils o’ertake us, You will not forsake us, And with Your help, O Lord, our struggles we win.

Our stewardship that flows from what God has done for us in Jesus Christ is rooted in history. Passed from one generation to the next, stewards of the Gospel connect God’s provision in the past to His continued care in the present.

So often, the struggles we face are self-inflicted. While there are indeed perils that can shake us from outside of ourselves, we are more likely enduring the suffering that comes because of our own choices that are outside the Word and will of God!
